MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS THE HOMES, INC. July 15, 2019

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of The Homes, Inc. was called to order at 6:00 p.m. on July 15, 2019.

Twenty-six stockholders and residents attended the meeting.

The stockholders and occupants were welcomed to the meeting. All persons in attendance were asked to hold their questions and comments until after the finish of regular business at which time anyone who wishes to speak will be allowed to make a statement.

Treasurer Olsen reported that he has reviewed the financial statement for the month of June, 2019 and found it to be in good order. Ray Olsen moved to approve the financial report. Seconded by Frank Moss. Carried unanimously.

There were no stockholder change requests approved by the manager.

Effie Barber moved to approve the stockholder change request. Seconded by Ray Olsen. Carried unanimously.

After being informed that the stock transfers were in order, it was moved by Effie Barber and seconded by Ray Olsen that the Corporation waive its option to purchase the shares of stock and approve transfer of same. Carried unanimously. The manager was reminded that all original signed stock certificates must be stored with the credit union if the stockholder has an outstanding loan.

Reports and Announcements:

The Neighborhood Watch Committee reported on the upcoming National Night Out Against Crime which will be held at 18th & Ridge.

The winner of the stockholder trivia drawing is Ray Smith who will receive \$30.00 of next month's maintenance fee.

Old Business to be Discussed:

The contract work for cement repairs, tree trimming and/or removal and porch replacements is ongoing.

New Business to be Discussed:

The restrooms at the park were recently vandalized with graffiti. It was painted over and a request has been made to the City to have the restrooms removed. Last time a request was made, the City required a hearing and it was going to be a long drawn-out process.

Two units had their electricity lines detached due to falling trees during storms. The cost to repair was approximately \$5,000 per unit.

A semi truck came through the neighborhood recently knocking down cable lines and causing damage to the siding of a unit. The company owning the truck has been contacted about the incident and will be billed for the repairs. Additional signage was discussed for the neighborhood to include signs with height limits.

A resident has requested to install a carport in the boat and trailer storage area. The stockholder would be responsible for maintenance and upkeep of the carport and would need to remove it if they sell their unit and move away. Rebecca Westpfahl moved to approve the request. Seconded by Ray Olsen. Carried unanimously.

The board discussed the City ordinance that requires all dogs and cats over the age of six months to be spayed or neutered. A request has been made to include this requirement in the Rules and Regulations. After discussion between the board and residents in attendance, the matter was tabled for further discussion at another meeting.

Cassie Sanford stated this is the first board meeting she attended.

Sherry McCool inquired about spraying for mosquitos.

Ralph Heiden thanked the maintenance staff for painting his building.

Marvin Smith asked that the negativity stop and asked for help for the maintenance staff.

Anna Windham commented on the maintenance staff and plumbing issues.

Bob Anver reported on how another housing cooperative in the area handles their maintenance work.

Karen Anver reported on an above ground pool in the neighborhood, suggested that the board meeting start times be changed and discussed office hours and stockholders renting their units.

Juanita Pirillo commented on the manager's responsibilities.

Liz Cerone thanked the manager for all of her work.

Shirley Elmore commented on the pet policy and the City ordinance that dogs and cats be spayed and neutered.

Rob Tavis asked that the hostility in the community stop.

Diane McCombs commented on the positive experience they had moving back to the community recently.

Brenda Aquino reported smelling smoke through the vents in her unit.

Martin Bosch expressed concerns about the ECKAN program and discussed tree trimming and painting strips in the parking bays.

Helene Martinez discussed parking in the community.

No further business to come before the board the board adjourned into executive session.

TIPS ON HOW TO BEAT THE HEAT

Beat the heat: Drink more water

You know how important it is to stay hydrated all year round. When you're sweating a lot, either because of exercise or the summer heat, drinking enough water becomes even more important. As the CDC suggests, think of your body like an air conditioner: Whenever your body heats up from physical activity or the hot weather outside, your internal air conditioner turns on and you begin to sweat. And remember, now that your air conditioner is using its coolant (your sweat), it is important to refill the tank — by drinking lots of H2O. As with other hydration myths, water isn't your only option, but it's free and easily accessible for most of us. Even if you have to trick yourself into drink more water and learn to love the taste of it, you'll be much more comfortable if you keep refilling your water glass.

Beat the heat: Peppermint tea mist

Brew a pot of peppermint tea, then stick it in the fridge. Once it's nice and cold, <u>Wonderhowto.com</u> suggests pouring some into a spray bottle and misting yourself with it. Better than water, the menthol in the tea will give your skin a tingly, cool feeling.

Beat the heat: Chrysanthemum tea

Whether it's hot or cold, chrysanthemum tea is served to lower body temperature, according to <u>China Daily</u>. It's also been said to soothe heat rash, experts told <u>Natural Health</u>.

Beat the heat: Breathe like a yogi

Next time you feel overheated, do a few minutes of yogic breathing, recommends <u>Art of Living</u>. Curl your tongue by pulling both sides upward toward the middle, then breathe in through your mouth. Hold your breath, and slowly exhale through your nose. Repeat five to 10 times.

Beat the heat: Chill your mattress

Put soft gel ice packs on top of the mattress and underneath the sheets; try under your legs, neck, or lower back for maximum comfort. Real Simple also suggests freezing a cotton sock filled with rice, then slipping it between the sheets. The rice will hold a chill longer.

Beat the heat: DIY air-conditioning

Freeze a couple of water bottles and place them in front of a floor or desk fan, and you'll enjoy a much cooler breeze with your makeshift air-conditioner. <u>Wikihow.com</u> advises adding salt to the water first to beat the heat longer; Apartment Therapy skips the bottles altogether in favor of a bowl of ice water.

Beat the heat: Aloe Vera

You know aloe vera soothes sunburn, and its cooling properties also work to help you beat the heat. Blogger Crunchy Betty offers different recipes to make spray of it, combining witch hazel and peppermint oil.

Beat the heat: Spicy food

If you're already sweating, why would you want to sweat more? Professor of food science at Penn State University Luke LaBorde offers this answer: eating spicy food increases blood circulation and makes you sweat, so you'll feel cooler as the sweat dries. Dr. Oz explains that the capsaicin in hot peppers encourages your body to sweat more without raising your body temperature.

Beat the heat: Pressure points

Lifehacker.com's solution to lower body temperature is to apply a bottle with ice-cold water on points like your ankles, wrists, back of the neck or behind the knees.

Back to School Sales Tax Holiday

With the new school year just around the corner, the Show Me State's tax-free weekend is coming up, too. This year, the state's Back to School Sales Tax Holiday runs from 12:01 a.m. Aug. 2 to midnight Aug. 4—that's *this* Friday through Sunday!

If you haven't bought your school supplies or clothes yet, now is the time to shop and save. And if you aren't heading back to school and just want to do some personal shopping, that's OK, too.

On purchases like clothing, school supplies, computers and software, the sales tax is exempt for this weekend only. But sales tax will still apply to accessories like watches, jewelry, handbags, scarves, ties, headbands, and belt buckles. But good news for parents of young children: The tax exemption applies to diapers!

There is a spending limit to get the tax exemption.

An article of clothing has to be \$100 or less; a school supply item can't exceed \$50; computer software must be \$350 or less; each personal computer or computer peripheral device can't exceed \$1,500; and a graphing calculator can't be more than \$150.

2019 Household Hazardous Waste Collection Days Set

Household Hazardous Waste Collection days for Wyandotte County residents includes the following Saturdays: May 18, June 15, July 20, August 17, September 21, and October 19, 2019. The site will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on those Saturdays.

Wyandotte County residents need to take their household hazardous products to 2443 South 88th Street in Kansas City, Kansas. (South on 88th Street from K-32) or (East of I-435 using Woodend exit near Kaw River) The HHW Days are not for business or nonprofit groups.

When bringing items to the collection site please label or identify all items. Items accepted include automotive products, home improvement products, household items, as well as lawn and garden products.

Automotive products accepted include auto batteries, brake fluid, carburetor cleaner, degreasers, gasoline & fuels, and used motor oil. In addition, residents can bring 10 car and/or pickup tires if the rims are removed from the tires.

Home improvement products accepted include concrete cleaner, driveway sealer, furniture stripper, glue with solvents, latex & oil based paints, paint thinner, putty, grout, calk & spackle, roofing tar, stain varnish & lacquer, turpentine, water-based glues, and wood preservatives.

Household items include aerosol products, drain & oven cleaners, mothballs, nail polish remover, polishes with solvents, spot remover, and propane cylinders.

Lawn and garden products include fertilizer with weed killer, herbicides, insecticides, pesticides, and rodent bait.

HELPFUL HINTS ABOUT LIVING IN THE HOMES

PLUMBING: DO NOT FLUSH FLUSHABLE WIPES. The pipes in our homes are over 70 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. The sink and tub drains are only for water disposal. Do not force items down the drains. If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a backup in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.

PARKING: The Homes does not have assigned parking. Please be considerate of your neighbors and their parking needs. Try not to park in a spot that is normally used by your neighbor. If you have guest, have them park in the overflow lots. NEVER PARK IN YARDS OR COMMON GROUND.

YARDS & PORCHES: Please take the time to clean up/organize your yard and porch. The size of our porches do not allow for you to keep many items on them before they start to look cluttered and messy. If you do not have a shed an affordable alternative is to store your items in a deck or patio box. They range in cost from \$30 to \$100 and can be purchased on-line or at your local discount store. Items that should not be on your porch: appliances, boxes, buckets, mops, paint containers or any other "non outdoor" items. The office offers free paint for your porch railings.

SPEEDING. The speed limit in The Homes, Inc. is 20 mph. It only takes a few seconds for a distracted child to dart out in the road. Please be aware and safe while driving.

AUTOMOBILE REPAIR. It is against the rules to work on your vehicle in The Homes. If your vehicle needs repair, then you will have to take your vehicle out of the neighborhood or take your vehicle to a mechanic. Unless you are changing a flat tire, you should NEVER put your vehicle on a jack in the Homes.

LITTERING. Think twice about throwing your trash out your car window or into someone's yard. First, it's rude and selfish. Someone will have to pick it up and most of the time it is the maintenance staff. This takes time and money away from other resident's needs. Second, it is against the law. Littering is a Class C violation that is punishable by a fine up to a \$500.00.

KEEP FURNACE AND WATER HEATER AREAS CLEAN. Having too many clothes, boxes, or general clutter in your utility area can be a fire hazard. Please keep yourself and your neighbors safe and keep your utility areas clean. DO NOT PILE CLOTHES OR OTHER ITEMS ON TOP OF THE WATER HEATER OR FLU AREA.

NOISE. Please be mindful of the level of noise you create. It is our responsibility to keep the sound we make to a reasonable level, so we are not disturbing our neighbors. Sometimes, simply communicating with your neighbors and working out an understanding can resolve this and many other problems.

STICKS AND LIMBS: Place sticks/limbs in 4 foot bundles to the curbside for pickup by maintenance.
