## FIREWORKS SAFETY INFORMATION

Fireworks may only be discharged between the hours of 9 a.m. and 11 p.m.

Fireworks may only be discharged from July 2nd through July 4th.

It is illegal to shoot fireworks from, on, or under a vehicle whether it is moving or parked.

Illegal fireworks include: "Home-made" ¼ and ½ sticks, M-80s, bottle rockets, missile-type rockets (with guidance fins) and sky lanterns.

#### HOW TO KEEP YOUR HOME COOLER DURING THE SUMMER

#### 1. Block the sun out

It may seem obvious, but many people love to let the light in and have sun streaming through the window. But, if you're wondering how to keep your house cool in summer, you may need to resist the temptation and keep curtains and blinds closed during the day.

- 2. Open windows and balcony/garden doors in the morning and at night make sure you have windows open at opposite ends of your home with the doors open in between. This will create a draft and allow air to move freely through your home.
- 3. Eat outside if you can and don't use the oven Make the switch to BBQ eating no one wants to be stuck in a kitchen with the oven on, not when it feels like you're IN an oven already.

#### 4. Turn off unused appliances

Consider turning things like your tv, desktop computer and kitchen appliances off - don't just leave them on standby. This will stop them overheating and warming the rooms they are in.

5. Turn lights off and invest in energy-saving lightbulbs

Conventional incandescent light bulbs generate light quite inefficiently, giving off waste heat in the process. Switch to low-energy light bulbs to reduce overheating and save money.

#### 6. Invest in some house plants

Plants boost your mood and can also help keep your house cool. Plants act as natural air conditioners and generate moisture into the atmosphere through a process known as transpiration.

#### 7. Use a fan to cool down a room

A top tip when using fans to cool down is to leave a large bowl of mounded ice in front of it while it's working. This will circulate cooler air around the room and function like a makeshift AC. Have a ceiling fan? Set it anti-clockwise for a similar cooling affect. If you have a basement, position a fan pointing up the stairs to the rest of the house. This will push the cooler air below the house up into the ground floor.

The board discussed cars in the neighborhood that are inoperable and not moving as well as vehicles with expired tags. The Sheriff's Department will be contacted who is going to start towing cars again soon.

The new mowing policy is working well. Management will be focusing on trimming yards over the next several weeks.

New Business to be Discussed:

Manager will distribute the move-in packet for new residents to the board next month for their review.

A new security light will be installed in the parking area of 782-792 Manorcrest. The installation cost will be between \$1,500 and \$2,000 and after that there will be a monthly fee. Several stockholders that park in that area requested the light.

The unit at 953-959 Manorcrest has had several problems with leaks in the roof. The cost to replace the roof will be \$9,184.00. Frank Moss moved to replace the roof at 953-959 Manorcrest. Seconded by Ron Bond. Carried unanimously.

Manager has obtained one bid to asphalt the new parking areas at the lower end of Viewcrest and 3 parking bays for \$15,800. Manager is going to get two more bids and will begin the work as soon as possible.

Letters have been sent out to all stockholders about the mowing policy and he enforcement of the trash policy. Many stockholders are putting out items that require special pickup and/or putting trash to the curb before 4:30 on Tuesday. Stockholders are being charged for violating trash rules.

In July occupancy forms will be sent out to all stockholders along with the Disaster Preparedness guide.

#### HELPFUL HINTS ABOUT LIVING IN THE HOMES

KEEP FURNACE AND WATER HEATER AREAS CLEAN. Having too many clothes, boxes, or general clutter in your utility area can be a fire hazard. Please keep yourself and your neighbors safe and keep your utility areas clean. DO NOT PILE CLOTHES OR OTHER ITEMS ON TOP OF THE WATER HEATER OR FLU AREA. CHANGE YOUR FURNACE FILTER ONCE A MONTH. FILTERS ARE FREE AT THE OFFICE.

PLUMBING: DO NOT FLUSH FLUSHABLE WIPES. The pipes in our homes are over 70 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. The sink and tub drains are only for water disposal. Do not force items down the drains. If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a back-up in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.

**LITTERING.** Think twice about throwing your trash out your car window or into someone's yard. First, it's rude and selfish. Someone will have to pick it up and most of the time it is the maintenance staff. This takes time and money away from other resident's needs. Second, it is against the law. Littering is a Class C violation that is punishable by a fine up to a \$500.00. If you are witnessed littering the police will be called and you will be charged, by The Homes, for the time it takes to pick it up and dispose of it.

**PARKING:** The Homes does not have assigned parking. Please be considerate of your neighbors and their parking needs. Try not to park in a spot that is normally used by your neighbor. If you have guest, have them park in the overflow lots. If you have vehicles that you do not drive, park it in a overflow lot. **NEVER PARK IN YARDS OR COMMON GROUND.** 

**NOISE.** Please be mindful of the level of noise you create. It is our responsibility to keep the sound we make to a reasonable level so we are not disturbing our neighbors. Sometimes, simply communicating with your neighbors and working out an understanding can resolve this and many other problems.

YARDS & PORCHES: Please take the time to clean up/organize your yard and porch. The size of our porches do not allow for you to keep many items on them before they start to look cluttered and messy. If you do not have a shed an affordable idea to store your items in are: deck and patio boxes. They range in cost from \$30 to \$100 and can be purchased on-line or at your local discount store. Items that should not be on your porch: appliances, boxes, buckets, mops, paint containers or any other "non outdoor" items. The office offers free paint for the porches.

**ONLY FLUSH TOILET PAPER.** The pipes in our homes are over 60 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a back up in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.

**SPEEDING.** The speed limit in The Homes, Inc. is 20 mph. It only takes a few seconds for a distracted child to dart out in the road. Please be aware and safe while driving.

**AUTOMOBILE REPAIR**. It is against the rules to work on your vehicle in The Homes. If your vehicle needs repair then you will have to go out of the neighborhood or take your vehicle to a mechanic. Unless you are changing a flat tire you should never put your vehicle on a jack in the Homes.

# 7/01 – 8/10/2022 - Through Darkness to Light: Photographs Along the Underground Railroad at Kansas City, Kansas Public Library

737 N 82nd St., Kansas City, KS 66112, (913) 295-8250, Price: Free. They left during the middle of the night—often carrying little more than the knowledge that moss grows on the north side of trees. An estimated 100,000 enslaved people between 1830 and the end of the Civil War in 1865 chose to embark on this journey in search of freedom. They moved in constant fear of being killed or recaptured, returned, and beaten as an example of what would happen to others who might choose to run. Under the cover of darkness, "fugitives" traveled roughly twenty miles each night traversing rugged terrain while enduring all the hardships that Mother Nature could bring to bear. Occasionally, they were guided from one secret, safe location to the next by an ever-changing, clandestine group known as the Underground Railroad. Many consider the Underground Railroad to be the first great freedom movement in the Americas and the first time when people of different races and faiths worked together in harmony for freedom and justice. Photographer Jeanine Michna-Bales has spent more than a decade meticulously researching "fugitive slaves" and the ways they escaped to freedom. While the unnumbered routes of the Underground Railroad encompassed countless square miles, the path Michna-Bales documented encompasses roughly 2,000 miles and is based off of actual sites, cities, and places that freedom-seekers passed through during their journey. This exhibition features beautifully dramatic color photographs, ephemera, and narratives that together tell the story of the Underground Railroad. The author is working with Princeton Architectural Press to prepare a publication that will combine eighty-two original photographs and text with a diverse sampling of related ephemera.

Price: free, Time: 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM, Recurrence: Recurring daily. The Fairfax Industrial District 100th Anniversary exhibit highlights the progression of the district alongside personal memories. It includes familiar and untold stories of people, places, and events in the district. This exhibit is designed to help visitors connect with the place where tens-of-thousands of residents have worked over the past 100 years. Many of the objects and stories on display were shared especially for this exhibit. Visitors will see products made in Fairfax together with items employees saved from their time in Fairfax. Visitors can compare maps of the district, find out how long a company was in business, and look through employee newsletters and newspaper articles. It is a great way for families to connect with their past and we encourage visitors to share their memories connected to the district. The Fairfax Industrial District began more than 100 years ago with a vision for the future. In 1922, area property owners signed a petition to form the Fairfax Drainage Board. This move ultimately led to the area becoming one of the first planned industrial district, in the country. Through the 1920s the district became a hub for flight schools and airplane manufactures. It continued to expand with new industries despite the Great Depression. The district became a National Center of the Defense Industry during World War II, housing the North American Aviation of Kansas, B-25 plant and the Darby Corporation, which produced landing crafts, aerial bombs, and more. After the war new companies made the district their home. Since then, the Fairfax Industrial District has grown to house more than 130 companies and is still going strong. A version of this exhibit will also be highlighted at the Fairfax Festival on October 6th, as part of the larger Centennial celebration brought together by the Fairfax Industrial Association.
